
Note from your Ed

The Vicar's Voice!

One of the wonderful things I love about my role as a priest is the many opportunities to bless people in God's name. Another joy is to anoint with Holy Oil.

As we approach Holy Week, the week before Easter, congregations and clergy are invited to gather in unity, to renew their commitment to ministry and to collect the Holy Oils at the Chrism Eucharist. There are three oils which, during this service, are blessed by the Bishop.

The oils are used for the sick and dying, for those being Baptised, called Catechumens, and Chrism for Confirmation, Ordination and the Anointing of Kings.

I was interested to learn that the oil to be used to anoint King Charles during his Coronation on 6 May has been made sacred in Jerusalem. A ceremony took place in The Church of the Holy Sepulchre, which is built on the site where Jesus is said to have been crucified and buried. The holy oil has been created using olives harvested from two groves on the Mount of Olives.

Closer to home in our Parish we have prayers for healing and anointing every month; here is what to expect:

Usually after a short talk, following the reading for the day, the priest invites the congregation up one by one to the altar rail at St Nicholas' or the dais/platform step at St Barnabas'. To begin with the priest may place their hands on your head and say a prayer, or say this beforehand -

In the name of God and trusting in his might alone, receive Christ's healing touch to make you whole. May Christ bring you wholeness of body, mind and spirit, deliver you from every evil,

and give you his peace.

Then the priest places a little oil on your forehead and hands or wrists and says these words -

I anoint you in the name of God who gives you life.

Receive Christ's forgiveness, his healing and his love.

May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, grant you the riches of his grace, his wholeness and his peace.

I hope in time that anointing and praying for healing will become a natural instinctive response when we are together.

May the Lord Bless You!





St Nicholas' Churchwarden Update

Warmth returns to Worth

Your Wardens report that warmth has returned to St Nicholas' Church, Worth. Not that there wasn't always warmth at Worth with our clergy and congregation, always welcoming each other and our many visitors in the warmest of ways. However, just after Christmas our church heating was decommissioned. There followed the best part of two months without heating and didn't we know it! The weather during this period was, as one might expect, cold and wet. Both elements quickly permeated the stone fabric of

our ancient building and we felt it daily.

Two old boilers

The story goes back to 2018 when we had recurring problems with our two boilers, in our below ground vault. They were becoming temperamental and Tony Chamier, our distinguished engineer, who was then a member of our congregation, recommended that they were replaced. The estimate to replace the boilers was eye-watering, being in excess of £50k, and it was only with very generous legacies and donations that we were able to commission the work. Of course, we were

hit with the pandemic and the work was put on hold.

A single boiler to replace the two existing boilers was bespoke made to fit the very limited access to the underground vault. It was manhandled down the very steep steps to the vault with 10mm clearance on either side of the steps.



What followed has been an amazing journey of design and build. Specialist flue designers were

commissioned to design and install the new flue system leading from the vault, through the vestry, choir chamber, ringing chamber and out through the stone at roof level. All works were overseen by our Inspecting Architect, and his Structural Engineer. The works required approval from the Diocese, whose Diocesan Advisory Committee have been extremely supportive, especially as our carbon footprint has been significantly reduced.

Seven extremely quiet and efficient convector heaters are now

installed and Warmth has returned to Worth.

Progress in other matters continues, which includes the appointment of Mark Harrison as our new Director of Music. Mark became interim DOM when Alex Hiam went off to pursue academic studies in Law. During this time, it is pleasing to note that the choir has grown and our wonderful tradition of choral music seamlessly continues.

We have installed a 'Magrini' baby changing foldaway unit in the utility-block accessible-toilet and, talking about accessibility, work continues on the access path from the Lychgate to the church. You may have noticed that the lighting along this path has been renewed.

A few thank yous are always welcome but this time the list is so long it's right to say that we know who you are and a big thank you for all your support!

Ring for the King



There are many churches in Sussex that will be ringing the bells for Their Majesties' coronation in May. The national campaign is indeed titled "Ring for the King."

There aren't many where one of the bells will be rung by a ringer who also rang for Her Late Majesty's Coronation back in 1953.

Gerald Sandwell, on the other hand, is no ordinary ringer. As a young man he'd been bell-ringing for only a few years in Essex when he was invited to ring for the celebration of Queen Elizabeth's Coronation.

In fact, he rang twice that day:

- Firstly, he rang a full peal at St Margaret's Church, Downham, near Wickford Essex. (A peal lasts roughly 3 hours.)
- Then he went to Downham WI to watch the Coronation on television.
- Then he and his band of ringers went to All Saints' Church, Rettendon, Essex where they were attempting another Peal. Alas, his rope broke 3/4 of the way through that one.

He didn't let that breaking rope put him off, since he rang for Her Majesty's Silver Jubilee in 1977, her Golden Jubilee in 2002, her Diamond Jubilee in 2012, and her Platinum Jubilee in 2022.

At Worth, he's also done several stints over the years as both Ringing Master and Tower Captain, and has been a Churchwarden.

He's also been Master of the Sussex County Association of Change Ringers, and more recently was their Education Officer for 14 years.

He has both a daughter and grandson who currently ring with him at Worth.

He clearly enjoys it!



PCC Meeting St Barnabas' Church,

PCC Meeting held 8 March 2023

The Rector opened the Meeting with prayers and a welcome.

Minutes of the last Meeting were agreed.

Matters Arising:

A date for Chalice Assistant training still to be identified.

Positive discussions continue for a defibrillator available to the Parish and the Worth Way Runners. A similar arrangement has been proposed for St Barnabas'.

Estate of the late Wendy Sulley is still in hand.

A burial site next to the late Cecil Butcher has been approved.

Changing the name of the Parish is in progress.

Promotion of Inclusive Church with both congregations is in hand.

Bishop Ruth has agreed to preside and preach at St Barnabas' on 11 June (St Barnabas' Day).



A copy of the Accounts was circulated. The cash position is sound. The Restricted funds, such as the Tower and Fabric Fund, continue to reduce as capital projects (such as the boiler project) are undertaken. Rising energy costs are noted. All bad debts have now been cleared. Accounts and report should be available for the APCM.

A pay increase for the bellringers will be considered.

APCM

To be held on 19 April. Reports from Parish groups to be available before this date.

Nomination forms to be available in churches for nominations for vacant posts on the PCC. MB thanked JT for all her hard work taking the Minutes. MB thanked Joan for all her work with the Minutes.

Fabric - St Nicholas'

Boiler project nearing completion. Arrangements have been made to restore the vestry storage cupboards and to reinstate flue boxing and access platform in the ringing chamber. Fr Michael thanked CS for his work on managing the project, who in turn thanked Fr. Michael, DA, RW and others, all of who have assisted greatly in the project. MB further thanked Anthony Chamier for pushing for us to replace the old boiler thereby reducing our carbon footprint.

The access path from the Lychgate to the West entrance of the church is a path that has become almost inaccessible for parishioners and visitors to the church who may be disabled. An application to remove the avenue of trees was refused by Crawley Planning Committee. An application to remove some of the trees was likewise refused both at Planning Committee and at appeal. A meeting with two of our local Councillors indicates that there may be support for the removal of the two most offending trees and a third tree that is leaning alarmingly. It is requested that the PCC support a further application for planning permission to remove these trees. The Proposal was unanimously approved. Our Inspecting Architect to make the necessary application.

Fabric - St Barnabas'

The Hall floor has been inspected by two contractors. Different solutions were advised. A decision is needed on whether a partial, and possibly short-term fix should be employed, or the whole floor replaced. A complete replacement was proposed.

The statutory 5 yearly electrical safety checks for St Barnabas' are scheduled (now completed – Ed) to be undertaken from 9-17 March.



Director of Music

It was agreed to offer the post to Mark Harrison.

Lent, Holy Week and Easter

A Lent Course is under way following the Diocesan Course 'Who then is This?'

Easter Services are being finalized, but to include Building the Easter Garden and the children's Egg Hunt.

Health and Safety Nothing to report.

Safeguarding

Regarding members of the church congregations visiting/helping/transporting others, if they are visiting regularly it needs to be defined if that person is doing it as a request from the clergy or as a friend of the person being visited. If as a request from Clergy and regarded as a Church Worker then a DBS or Enhanced DBS needs to be completed and approved, and a decision made as to the type of task/job.

Both churches need to provide a list of 'who' does 'what' within the church and if a DBS is required.

Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod are looking for both a Treasurer and a Secretary, to replace two people who will be standing down after a number of years' service.

The Deanery Budget Meeting will take place on 18 October.

Coronation Event Planning

Special prayer books are now available in both churches.

Next Meetings

On God's Train

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Before and After

We fairly frequently receive enquiries about burials in St Nicholas' graveyard. We hold a database of monuments up to about 1966, although subsequent burials are not listed.

We received a request from Steven Feist searching for the grave of James Feist (d.1925) and Ellen Feist

(d.1941), and found them in our records. Although the location of the grave was given, graves can still be difficult to find - in this case because there was no headstone, only kerbstones.

We also identified Sgt Major George S Feist of the Australian Light Infantry, listed on the War Memorial tablet inside the Church.

Steven visited Worth and with the expert help of Jason, Ashley and Paul found the grave after some searching and cleared it; a success! Steven subsequently wrote:

I can't believe we managed to find my great grandfather and grandmothers grave, against all odds, but definitely a team effort! Thanks to Ashley and John for your help. Brilliant to get a chance to meet.

The pictures attached are of James and Ellen and also with their family, including my grandfather and George Samuel.

Prior to the 1st world war my Grandfather, James Henry (James's son) was posted to Leith, the port outside Edinburgh where he met and married my Grandmother. They settled in Scotland. After surviving the war he chose to reduce his term in the army by volunteering for a year in Sierra Leonne. Unfortunately he contracted malaria there which eventually did for him. During a period of illness in 1924 he returned to Three Bridges but died while visiting. At his request his body was returned to Edinburgh and is buried at Liberton cemetery.

In cricket whites is George Samuel who died on the Somme and is named on the memorial within the church.

Many thanks again for your help and to everyone involved, - a very special day.



















The Royal Maundy

You will be familiar with the clergy washing the feet of selected members of the congregation on Maundy Thursday. 'Maundy Thursday' because the Gospel for that day includes Christ's command (mandatum) at the Last Supper that, having washed the disciples' feet, "ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done unto you."

Another ancient tradition occurs on that day – the Royal Maundy which dates from the Fourth or Fifth Century (some say 660 AD). Originally the reigning monarch washed the feet of beggars and gave gifts of clothing and food. The ceremony evolved over the years, with sums of money replacing the gifts of clothes and food. The feet were pre-washed by various officials and nosegays (still present) employed to mask any offensive odour.

The involvement of the monarch, however, declined by the early 20th Century and was only revived in 1932, although then not consistently. However, HM the late Queen regarded the service as important and attended almost every year of her reign. She also instigated the movement of the ceremony around different cathedrals and by the end of her reign it had been held in every cathedral in England.

In the modern form of the Royal Maundy a number men and women are recommended by local Christian leaders; all are pensioners and selected for their contribution to the community. The number of men and women is in each case equal to the age of the sovereign. There are, in addition, a small number of Maundy Children. The Yeoman of the Guard ('Beefeaters') attend as does the Choir of the Chapel Royal.



Each of the recipients receives two leather purses. The red purse contains £5.50 in lieu of the gift of clothing and food. The white purse contains Maundy coins in total to the age of the sovereign. The coins are specially minted, in denominations of 1, 2, 3 and 4 pence, to a design

hardly changed since 1822. Keen numismatists will notice that the portrait of HM the late Queen is unchanged from the one created in 1952; it has not been updated along with coins in general circulation. The coins are legal tender although worth substantially more than their face value.

ln retirement

my late father was an administrator for Southwell Minster and heavily involved in arranging the service in 1984; he also acted as a steward. In recognition he received the appropriate fee in Maundy coins — 10p. (right)

As already noted, nosegays are carried by the royal party and other officials. My clever green-fingered mother obtained the rosemary from the Duke of Edinburgh's nosegay, propagated it, and we still have the 'Duke of Edinburgh's rosemary' in the garden.



From experience I can report that it is a happy and relaxed occasion, with the late Queen chatting with many of the recipients. Many

recipients also give her gifts in return; on one notable occasion a jar of marmalade!



Church Mouse

Easter for Pedants

Recently, a loving friend gave me a copy of The Pedant's Revolt (by Andrea Barham). Now, why did they think that an appropriate book for Church Mouse? He does admit to committing the sin of being overconcerned with minor details and rules, and is too keen to display academic learning.

But Church Mouse is not infallible. Into adult life he thought a special kind of silver came from Scotland, and only recently discovered that a species of pine did not come from the same country; silly old mouse!


Church Mouse may also have committed the error, in these pages, of believing that 'Easter' came from the Anglo-Saxon goddess of fertility and spring: Eostre or Eostrae. But apparently not so, although we can blame the Venerable Bede for putting the idea about in the 8th century.

It is now thought that 'Easter' came from Easter week as in albis - and via a mistranslation.

Easter week was known by Christians in the West as hebdomada alba (white week) as the newly baptised wore their white baptismal robes during this week. Sometimes the week was contracted to albae.

When this was translated into German, it was mistaken as the plural of alba meaning 'dawn'. This was rendered in Old High German as Eostarum (dawn), which is how we got to 'Easter' in English.

I am glad we have that straight!

Chapel Talks

INCLUSIVE CHURCH?

Most congregations would say they are inclusive and welcoming but I sometimes think their inclusion may be limited to people who are just like themselves, think or look like themselves. They can talk the talk of inclusion but can they walk the walk? So, what does it mean to be a truly inclusive church? How do we let the wider community know we really would not turn anyone away from our door and that we do our best to welcome everyone and anyone?

There is a network of churches, groups and individuals 'uniting together around a shared vision of a church which celebrates and affirms every person and does not discriminate' called Inclusive Church (www.inclusive-church.org) By joining this network (free, donations welcome) and publicising our membership, we would, I believe, make it easy for those who are looking to join a church but are uncertain about how they might be welcomed, to feel at home. In February 2023, General Synod once again considered the Church of England's welcome, inclusion or exclusion of LGBT Christians. Legislation to allow same-sex marriage in England and Wales was passed by Parliament in July 2013. Ten years ago. I wonder how long parliament will be patient with us?

The closest inclusive churches to us in Crawley are St Matthew's Redhill, St Peter & St Paul's Lingfield and Forest Row Baptist Church.

The recent work in the St Barnabas' complex to level the floor and install a self-opening door has been a great advance in welcoming those with mobility issues. Both churches have large print hymn and service books but can we do more for those with visual or hearing or other impediments? Are we dementia friendly, or even dementia aware? Being an inclusive church is as much about a journey of discovery as a destination.

A Visit to Nuremburg 2011

This church had been virtually destroyed by Allied bombing, but what we found in the reconstructed church was very humbling. We came across a Cross made of nails; this had been sent from Coventry and was made of nails recovered from the old and bombed out Coventry Cathedral. There were many prayers and poems about reconciliation and we found this litany on one of the pillars.

Vesture [3]

In the last of this series of articles we will look at some more unusual forms of clerical dress.

To accompany a cassock you may see a **cincture**, a (usually) black cummerbund with long fringed falls – occasionally seen at St Nicholas'. (Confusingly, in the Roman Catholic Church the girdle is known as a cincture, and the cincture as a fascia.)

Another rare sighting may be a **scapular** (right), as one hangs in the Rectory. It is essentially two rectangles of cloth joined at the shoulders (scapula), often

controlled with a belt. This is really a monastic garment which acts as an apron to preserve the monastic habit (no jokes please about monks with dirty habits).

The final rarity worth noting is **clerical morning dress** (left), although strictly only for bishops, archdeacons and some deans. It consists of a square-cut knee-length morning coat over a clerical shirt, with breeches and gaiters. A shame it is not more commonly worn.

There are other garments, especially for bishops, including the **rochet**, a floor length surplice with very full sleeves, over which is worn a **chimere**, a long sleeveless

overgarment, but we need to stop somewhere!



Those of us brought up on mid-twentieth century films know that clergymen wear a black trilby; but no more as hats are decreasingly worn in any situation. Hats now tend to be favoured by those of a High Church tradition. Within the Catholic Church small skullcaps similar to a Jewish kippa may be worn, known as a **zucchetto** (right). Normally black unless you are a cardinal (red) or the Pope (white)





Crossing the denominations there is the **biretta** (left), a square folding hat with three ridges and a pom on top. Coloured poms are now in fashion. Fr Andrew Piper used to be fond of wearing a biretta.

Archbishop Michael Ramsey commonly used to wear a **Canterbury cap** (right), a square hat with sharp corners but soft and foldable. Often worn with a priest's gown and then known as **walking**

dress. In the long-forgotten days when women were expected to wear a hat in church, women choristers often wore a version of the Canterbury cap.



Perhaps the most splendid hat, and much appreciated

by Church Mouse is the **cappello romano** or **saturno** (left); a round hat with a low crown and a wide brim. 'Father Brown' wears one in the eponymous TV detective series. This is a smart and practical hat, but never seems to have found favour in the Anglican Church. A pity!



As an academic I used to enjoy dressing up in my doctoral gown and hood for degree congregations, and I even remember a time when black teaching gowns were routinely worn. But the clergy can have so much more fun!


